MACLAS 2022 at The College of New Jersey.

Attracting participants from across the hemisphere, MACLAS held its 23rd academic conference at The College of New Jersey (TCNJ) on March 18 and 19, 2022. The conference theme, "Privilege, Power, and Pedagogy," explored the contradictions of a region so diverse yet suffering from vast social inequities. Eighteen panels showcased research from various disciplines in the social sciences and humanities. A hybrid format allowed participation from Latin American countries as well as U.S. scholars still stranded by the pandemic. MACLAS strives for inclusivity in the identities of participants, their research agendas and methodologies, and countries of origin. A photo exhibit of "Braceros" and a film on the Latin American community in Trenton, NJ complemented the panels.

Recipient of the 2021 Whitaker Prize for best book recently published, Professor Jeffrey Pugh (University of Massachusetts at Boston) gave the keynote speech on how non-governmental organizations assist migration in the region. The flow of migrants and internally displaced people has reached historical levels, straining state resources. To a large degree, migrants adhere to an "invisibility bargain" whereby the lack of demand for public support prevents social resentment of migrants. Non-governmental organizations can fill the resulting resource void, a topic Pugh knows well since he created such a group.



Note that TCNJ also provided the instructional technology to host virtually the 2020 and 2021 conferences. Salisbury University in Maryland will host the 2023 conference, whose theme is "The Afro-Americas: A Hemispheric Conversation."

Please accept my deepest appreciation for your generosity in honoring my work with the Judy McInnis Distinguished Service Award at the 2022 MACLAS meeting. I know that this award is not granted every year, which also makes it special. Judy was an extraordinary person, whom I met at my first MACLAS meeting, and I am humbled to have received an honor that bears her name.

MACLAS has been a very special place for me, as I was struck from the initial sessions I attended by the supportive, collegial atmosphere at every session. MACLAS meetings were so marvelous in this way that I began to sponsor Howard University graduate and undergraduate student scholars to present their research, many of them for the first time in a professional forum. Thanks to a very supportive department chair, who observed how importantly the MACLAS "baptism by fire" strengthened our students, funding was made available for each meeting for ten years, and we went from Kutztown (2003) to American University (2012), with memorable conferences at Muhlenberg, Virginia Commonwealth, Ponce (PR), Albright, Maryland Baltimore Campus, William & Mary, Johns Hopkins, and Pittsburgh. The encouragement and guidance our students continually received was priceless to them both personally and professionally, and several have gone on to careers in academia, in no small part thanks to their very positive MACLAS experiences.

I am honored to be involved with the publication of the MACLAS journal, the *Middle Atlantic Review of Latin American Studies* (*MARLAS*). Never before have I had the opportunity to work alongside, and learn from, such dedicated and talented colleagues as Ivani Vassoler, Diane Johnson, Jeff Pugh, and Greg Schelonka. The support we give and receive is reflected, I believe, in the high quality of the journal issues.

MACLAS is both a showcase and training ground for leadership. In addition to 18 members involved in *MARLAS*, at any given time, 30 members gain professional experience by serving on our prize committees and the executive council. It is no coincidence that many of the elected officers often are, or become, program and department heads on their campuses and in organizations. I have seen the benefits of this in action, when members have sought, and generously received, informal, one-on-one mentoring from the leaders that abound in MACLAS.

My thanks to the McInnis Committee members, Gloria B. Clark, Brian Turner, and Kathleen Cunniffe-Peña, for their support and kind narrative regarding my contributions to our organization. There is no higher honor than to be recognized for your work by your colleagues, and I thank you from the bottom of my heart.

MACLAS 2023 at Salisbury University

The Afro-Americas: A Hemispheric Conversation.

The 1950 UNESCO Statement on Race and the 2015-2024 International Decade for People of African Descent proclaimed by the United Nations contained important conceptualizations of the Black experience across the Americas throughout the 20th and early 21st centuries. These documents may be seen as part of a legal framework intended to establish a binding contract with respect to social and human rights in a post-colonial ordering of the world. Yet understanding race from an institutional perspective must go beyond recognizing the historical evidence of cultural and scientific racism that made the history of Western civilization possible. In the context of Latin America and the Caribbean, this means defining the legacy of Afro-descendants by their ongoing struggle for freedom and collective consciousness in a region shaped by economic, social, political, and racial inequalities. From isolated instances of Black political activism during the nation-building process to transnational movements focused on dismantling systemic structures of oppression and violence, Afro-descendants across the Americas have been able to tackle historical racial injustices and develop counternarratives to those of racialized overtones.

Salisbury University will host scholars of Latin America & the Caribbean from across the mid-Atlantic region and beyond for this conference.

Salisbury University's beautiful 200-acre campus is located on the south end of the City of Salisbury in Wicomico County on Maryland's scenic Eastern Shore, which is part of the Delmarva Peninsula. Salisbury is 30 miles west of the beach resorts at Ocean City, MD, and the Assateague Island National Seashore. The city also is 115 miles southeast of Baltimore, MD, and Washington, D.C.; 125 miles south of Philadelphia, PA; and 125 miles north of Norfolk, VA.

Assistant Professor of Caribbean Studies

Department of Modern Languages & Literatures

SUNY Oswego

The Department of Modern languages and Literatures seeks a new or advanced Assistant Professor in Latin American literature and culture with expertise in Caribbean studies. The successful candidate will teach Caribbean, Latin American, and Peninsular undergraduate language and literature courses and have expertise in one or more of the following areas: race and ethnicity; Afro-Latin America; indigenous studies; and/or gender and sexuality. In addition, the applicant will be expected to demonstrate teaching excellence and a solid research commitment. The Assistant Professor will participate in collaborative activities with our high schools, increasingly engage in departmental and college assignments, committee assignments, and other tasks associated with the responsibilities of a full-time faculty appointment, including advisement, monitoring student clubs & activities.

The Caribbean specialist should also have previous experience teaching and advising at Hispanic-serving institutions and work effectively with students and faculty from all backgrounds: underrepresented students, racial and ethnic minorities, women, individuals who identify with LGBTQ+ communities, individuals with disabilities, and first-generation college graduates from lower-income families.

SUNY Oswego works continuously to create an inclusive environment that respects, embraces, and promotes cultural safety, belonging, civil discourse, cultural humility, and other values and goals outlined in SUNY Oswego's Strategic Diversity and Inclusion Plan. As such, the Assistant Professor will be expected to contribute to these efforts and possess the communication and interpersonal skills necessary to engage effectively with an increasingly diverse community of students and colleagues.

Review of applications will begin February 13, 2023 and will continue until the position is filled.
