Update on the MACLAS Journal

At the last Executive Council Meeting during the conference in Ithaca, the board voted to accept the proposal prepared by Jeff Pugh and the subcommittee charged with addressing the new journal format. Moving forward, the journal hopes to partner with a host university institution to create an online open access journal on Latin American Studies that may include articles in English, Spanish, Portuguese, or French stemming from research conducted for the MACLAS conferences as well as other research in the field of Latin American Studies. The journal editorial staff will be comprised of approximately four lead editors including an outreach and publicity editor and an editorial board of fifteen members. It will also have an advisory board of high-profile Latin Americanists who will lend their advice and suggestions to the journal and occasionally edit an

article. All articles will be subject to a double-blind peer review by the editorial board and external reviewers. We will publish special issues on a given topic with guest editors on a periodic basis at the discretion of the editorial board. For the time being, the current editor, Brian Turner, will be accepting articles for spring 2016 until September 4, 2015. We congratulate him and associate editors John Stolle-McAllister, Regina Root, and Ivani Vassoler for their continued efforts during the transition. We hope to be on schedule for the publication of the next volume next spring. Once the online platform is in place, we will accept articles on a continuous basis and will move to [continued on next page]

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publication as soon as the article itself has been reviewed, accepted, and revised as needed. Submissions should be sent by e-mail attachment to Brian at bturner@rmc.edu in a Word File (.doc)

When submitting your article for consideration, please adhere to the following guidelines:

- Double-space the entire article.
- Use footnotes rather than endnotes; parenthetical citation is welcome.
- On a separate page, put the title of the article, centered and in caps. On the next two lines, put
 your name and the name of your institution. These also should be centered, but with only first
 letters capitalized. Do not use headers other than to place page numbers.
- Put titles of books and journals in italics. Do not use boldface type or different font sizes.

Highlights from MACLAS 2015

The 2015 conference was held at Ithaca College April 17-18, 2015. The theme was "Altered States: Cross-disciplinary explorations of tradition and the emergent in Latin America." Participants were invited to discuss ideas and patterns that challenge tradition, and the interplay between old and new, seeking to examine alterations



from a wide variety of perspectives and academic disciplines.



Featured Articles: The Recent Work of our MACLAS prize winners

Below you will find the descriptions of the work of two of our members, Luis Roniger and Kia M.Q. Hall, who were recently awarded MACLAS prizes for their stellar research.

Luis Roniger



Luis Roniger was awarded the 2014 Whitaker prize for his book, Destierro y exilio en América Latina, coauthored with Mario Sznajder and published by the Fondo de Cultura Economica in Mexico, 2013. His investigation addresses exile as a major

mechanism of institutional exclusion used by all types of governments in the region against their own citizens, while at the same time these governments often provided asylum to aliens fleeing persecution. It is a systematic analysis of Latin American exile on a continental and transnational basis and from a long-term perspective. It traces variations in the saliency of exile among different expelling and receiving countries; across different periods; with different paths of exile, both elite and massive: and under authoritarian and democratic regimes. The study integrates theoretical hindsight and empirical findings, also addressing presidential exile, the formation of Latin American communities of exiles worldwide, and the role exiles played in shaping the collective identities of these countries. The book expands on an English version entitled The Politics of Exile in Latin America, published by Cambridge University

Press in 2009, and builds upon the bibliographical essay on the study of Latin American exile that Roniger prepared for Oxford Bibliographies Online in 2014: http://www.oxfordbibliographies.com/view/document/obo-9780199766581/obo-9780199766581-0147.xml?rskey=xvFuMm&result=66&q=

Roniger has continued his work on exile and has published two more books as part of this research program: Tres estudios sobre el exilio: Condición humana, experiencia histórica y significación política, co-authored with Arturo Aguirre and Antolin Sánchez Cuervo (Madrid and Pueblan: EDAF and Universidad Autónoma de Puebla, 2014) and Destierro y exilio en América Latina. Nuevos estudios y avances teóricos (Buenos Aires: EUDEBA, 2014). His most recent publication is "Displacement and Testimony: Recent History and the Study of Exile and Post-Exile." International Journal of Politics, Culture and Society, online March, 2015 as DOI: 10.1007/s10767-015-9201-7

Currently Roniger is working with Leonardo Senkman, Saul Sosnowski, and Mario Sznajder to complete the book Exile, Transnational Migration and the Transformation of Public Culture, an analysis of the impact of exiles, returnees and migrants on the process of democratization in Argentina, Chile, Paraguay, and Uruguay.

Kia M.Q. Hall

In 2014, Kia M. Q. Hall was awarded the Christina Turner Graduate Student Travel Grant to attend the MACLAS conference, and present about "Poverty & Social Justice in the Rural, Garifuna Villages of Honduras." The presentation developed from her desire to extend her research engagement with the Garifuna community of Honduras into the realm of social justice engagement. Since graduating in May 2014 from American University's School of International Service, she has continued to collaborate with research and community development partners in Honduras. She last visited the Garifuna ancestral villages of Iriona, where her research was based, in January 2015. Shortly after, Kia received the Wladyslaw Maryan Froelich Research Grant in support of her work in the region.

Throughout the Americas, the images of impoverished Black communities often tell a story of destitution and marginalization. The book of photographs to be printed and distributed to research participants with the support of the Froelich Research Grant aims to tell a different story. The book of photographs will show the hard-working women (and men) who produce and sell cassava bread, or *ereba* in the Garifuna language, to advance community development. In both image selection and book design and layout, Kia M. Q. Hall will be mentored by renowned photographer Roland L. Freeman, who has been documenting Black culture throughout the African Diaspora for over fifty years. The "Ereba Iriona Photography Project" will be presented at the 2016 MACLAS conference.
