Salisbury University will host scholars of Latin America & the Caribbean from across the mid-Atlantic region and beyond for this conference.

Salisbury University's beautiful 200-acre campus is located on the south end of the City of Salisbury in Wicomico County on Maryland's scenic Eastern Shore, which is part of the Delmarva Peninsula. Salisbury is 30 miles west of the beach resorts at Ocean City, MD, and the Assateague Island National Seashore. The city also is 115 miles southeast of Baltimore, MD, and Washington, D.C.; 125 miles south of Philadelphia, PA; and 125 miles north of Norfolk, VA.

# **KEYNOTE and PLENARY SPEAKERS: MACLAS 2020**

# **KEYNOTE SESSION SPEAKER:**

**Dr. Jennifer Jolly** (Professor of Art History, Ithaca College) will be the keynote speaker. She was awarded the 2019 Arthur P. Whitaker Prize for the best book published in the previous two years by a member of MACLAS. Her book is titled *Creating Pátzcuaro, Creating Mexico: Art, Tourism, and Nation Building under Lázaro Cárdenas* (Univ. of Texas Press 2018).

The title of her keynote talk will be: **Afro-Mexican Visibility in 19th century Mexico: The Case of José Maria Morelos.** Abstract:

In 1946, Mexican anthropologist Aguirre Beltrán published La Población Negra de Mexico, seeking to make visible Mexico's "third root." In it, he offered a history of Afro-descendent peoples in Mexico and identified famous Mexicans who had crossed the "color line," including independence hero Jose Maria Morelos, whose portraits "reveal" the truth of his heritage. This talk asks us to reconsider what we are looking for when we look to portraits record as evidence of Morelos's racial status and addresses two core questions. First, how do ideas about blackness and brownness (and moreno status, as opposed to the more commonly discussed mestizo status) develop and change in nineteenth and early twentieth-century Mexico? Second, given that many nineteenth-century Afro-mestizos placed great stakes on finally being able to become invisible as such and blend in to the larger mixture that was Mexico, what does it mean for today's scholars to try to see them again?

**Melixa Abad Izquierd**o is Assistant Professor of History at Farmingdale State College in Farmingdale, NY. Her research interests are Latin American popular culture and its connections to politics, gender and race. Loves teaching her students about the rich, complex and fascinating culture of Latin America.

Brian Potter teaches courses in political economy and international relations, with a focus on Latin America. After earning his Ph.D. in Political Science from UCLA, Potter taught at Tulane University before coming to The College of NJ in 2004. His work on environmental and economic policy has appeared in Latin American Perspectives, the Canadian Journal of Political Science, Energy and Development, Environmental Politics and as chapters in edited volumes.

Marny Requa is an Associate Professor at Georgian Court University in Lakewood, New Jersey, and Chair of the Department of Criminal Justice, Anthropology, and Sociology. Her expertise is in human rights and comparative socio-legal studies, and she has published on human rights and the Supreme Court in Chile. She was a founding member of the Latin American Studies Forum at her previous institution, Queen's University Belfast. Currently she is a member of the International Human Rights Committee of the New York City Bar, and she has traveled to Guantánamo Bay, Cuba, on behalf of the Committee to observe military commission hearings.

James A. Baer is an emeritus professor of history at the Alexandria Campus of Northern Virginia Community College. He received his Ph.D. in Latin American History from Rutgers, the State University of New Jersey. Jim serves as the Board Chair of the Council on Hemispheric Affairs (COHA) as it transitions after the death of its founder, Larry Birns. He is the author of several articles on Argentine social history and Cuban Protestants. His latest book, A Social History of Cuba's Protestants: God and the Nation was published by Lexington Books in July 2019. Jim joined MACLAS in 1982 and has previously served on the Executive Committee, several prize committees and as MACLAS president.

# MACLAS ELECTIONS cont'd

Please vote yes or no on the proposed amendment to Article V of MACLAS' Constitution below, in **BOLD**:

### Article V. Executive Committee

5.1 The Executive Committee shall consist of four officers, the Past President for the year immediately following his or her term of office, and six other members, one of whom may be from outside the Middle Atlantic region, to be elected by plurality vote of individual members conducted by mail prior to the annual meeting of MACLAS. The six other members shall serve for three (10) years on a staggered basis, and may not immediately succeed themselves. No more than three of the ten members not including the Past President, may be from the same state or the District of Columbia. MACLAS' Webmaster is also included in the Executive Committee, as he/she/they play a key role in disseminating the information about MACLAS' purpose (which is: 'to foster and develop interest in Latin American Studies by scholars, researchers, teachers, students and interested professionals primarily located in the Middle Atlantic region, to encourage more effective training, teaching and research, and to facilitate greater exchange of information and ideas').

# Things to do in Salisbury, MD

Known as the Capital of the Eastern Shore, and with a population of some 30,000, Salisbury the largest city on the Eastern Shore and the No. 1 fastest growing city in Maryland, according to city officials. Founded in 1732 and incorporated in 1854, it also is the county seat for Wicomico. The area offers the ideal mix of an urban center, nestled within a scenic rural region, centrally located to major metropolitan areas.

Located just two miles from campus, <u>Downtown Salisbury</u> is a designated Main Street Maryland community, with <u>shops, restaurants</u> and events. A <u>trolley</u> service runs between SU and downtown during the semester. <u>Here</u> is a map.

Other attractions include the Pemberton Historical Park, the Ward Museum of Wildfowl Art, and Ocean City nearby.
