Candidates for the MACLAS Executive Council (3-year term)

Ivette Guzmán-Zavala, Lebanon Valley College, Associate Professor of Spanish B.A., University of Puerto Rico; M.A., Syracuse University; Ph.D., Rutgers University, New Brunswick

Guzmán Zavala is a native of Caguas, Puerto Rico and teaches Spanish language courses at all levels. She pursues research interests in Latin America and the Hispanic Caribbean. Her conference presentations and publications chiefly involve the representation of motherhood in literary texts and the visual arts.

León Arredondo, West Chester University, Associate Professor of Anthroplogy

I was born in Colombia where I completed my secondary education. I obtained a BA degree in anthropology from Montclair State University and a Ph.D. in anthropology from the Graduate Center-CUNY. I taught anthropology and Latin American Studies in the City University of New York-CUNY system, Colby College, Kean College, Felician College, and the University of Costa Rica, and currently teach at West Chester University in Pennsylvania. My primary area of research is working-class culture and politics. I conducted research on the social history, culture and politics of dockworkers on the Magdalena River in Colombia during the first half of the twentieth century. My current research projects in Colombia include the history of collective social action in an industrial city and the recent experience with violence and insecurity.

Candidate for Vice President

Patricia Rodríguez is Associate Professor of Politics at Ithaca College, NY. Her research interests include ethnic, peasant, and worker mobilizations in Brazil, Chile, and Colombia, the possibilities and challenges of cohesive alliance-building, and the consequences for democracy, social justice, human rights, and the environment. She is working on a book manuscript that explores the quest for 'peace in the territories' in Colombia from the perspective of organized civil society, in the context of government negotiations with armed rebel groups. The work explores the ways in which alternative economic, territorial, and socio-political proposals challenge dominant actors and forces in the name of creating space for a more dignified life in the so called post-conflict period. She has recently published an article on the civic strike in Buenaventura, Colombia, 'The People Don't Give up Dammit' (*Dollars and Sense*, November/December 2017); and a co-authored research paper on indigenous movement-partisan politics in Chile during the 1980s, 'Partisan Participation and Ethnic Autonomy in Chile,' (*Journal of Latin American Studies*, 2015). She is guest co-editing an upcoming special issue of MARLAS on 'Contention and nonviolent action in Latin America: Theory and practice.' Patricia was on the MACLAS Executive Committee (2013-2016).

Władysław Maryan Froelich Research Award Winners

The Władysław Maryan Froelich Research Award. Polishborn Władysław (Laszlo) Maryan Froelich (d.2010) lived in Latin America for many years and showed a deep affinity for the region's culture and people. A business professional by training, he demonstrated great passion for scholarship on topics as varied as Latin American folk art, pre-Colombian art and history, Argentine gaucho culture, and the landscape of the pampas.

MACLAS is pleased to announce the two winners for the Władysław Maryan Froelich Research Award 2017. These two projects illustrate the spirit of Laszlo's varied interest on Latin American topics and the recipients will present their research at a future MACLAS conference.

Dr. Silvia Peart, Ph.D., Language and Cultures Department, United States Academy, focuses on important and current topics in the culture and reality of Mexico. Dr. Peart's research project is "Climate Migration Narratives in Mexico: Environmental Change and Mobility." Climate is a powerful signifier and one that is applicable to many contexts. Some of the topics that best describe the 20th and 21st centuries: climate change and migration.

Dr. Jeff Pugh, Ph.D., Department of Conflict Resolution, Human Security, and Global Governance, University of Massachusetts, Boston, examines the participatory climate in Latin America. Who can participate? Who has a voice in the many and diverse arenas in the Latin American cultural context? Dr. Pugh's research project, "Voices from the South: Participatory Action Research on Strategic Nonviolent Action in Latin America," embodies the spirit of Laszlo's diverse interests.

Dr. Peart and Dr. Pugh will each receive \$500.00 to further their research projects.
