PJ Lobster House (Port Jefferson) – Restaurant and fish market specializing in fresh lobster

The Fifth Season (Port Jefferson) – Locavore American eatery with a harbor view



To do:

Avalon Park and Reserve: A nature park with walking trails and a duck pond, located 1.6 miles from the SBU campus

Stony Brook Village: Includes shops, restaurants, cafes, and a carriage museum (http://www.stonybrookvillage.com/)

Three Village Historical Society (Setauket, NY): Learn more about local history, such as Native Americans who first called this region home and General Washington's Culper Spy Ring (www.threevillagehistoricalsociety.org)

The Jazz Loft (Stony Brook, NY): A collaborative center run by a historian, the Jazz Loft features talented musicians and historic jazz memorabilia (www.thejazzloft.org)

Port Jefferson Harbor (pictured above): Downtown Port Jefferson offers shops, restaurants, and the family-friendly Maritime Explorium

Getting to and around Long Island

Travel and parking information for MACLAS 2019

Stony Brook University is accessible by car, train, or plane. The Long Island Rail has a stop on the Stony Brook campus, just a few minutes' walk from the Humanities Institute and the Wang Center, where our events will take place.

Traveling by car: From New York City and other points west of Southampton, travelers would take I-495 (Long Island Expressway) to Route 111.

Traveling by plane: Long Island's Islip-MacArthur Airport is 16 miles from the campus and is serviced by direct flights and commuter airlines. New York Area Airports (LaGuardia, JFK, and Newark) are approximately 50 miles to the west. From Kennedy Airport, you can take the AirTrain to Jamaica Station and transfer to the Long Island Railroad for the train to Stony Brook.

Traveling by train: Take the Long Island Railroad's Port Jefferson line from Penn Station in Manhattan to Stony Brook. The LIRR station is at the north end of the campus.

Taxi/Uber: If you arrive to campus by taxi, the closest address for both the Humanities Institute (Friday panels) and the Wang Center (Saturday panels) is: 100 Nicolls Rd, Stony Brook, NY 11790.

Parking on campus

Hotel Parking: Attendees who are staying at the recommended hotel, the Hilton Garden Inn Stony Brook, will have hotel parking. The Humanities Institute and Charles B. Wang Center are both within a 5-minute walk from the hotel.

Campus Parking: Parking is available in the Admin Garage, located directly across the street from the Hilton Garden Inn Stony Brook. Parking validation for Friday will be available at the conference registration table for \$5. Parking is free on Saturday. The Humanities Institute and the Charles B. Wang Center are both within a 5-minute walk from the garage.

Candidate for Vice President, 2019-2020

Assistant Professor of Anthropology at West Chester University, **León Arredondo** was born in Colombia, where he completed his secondary education. He obtained a BA degree in anthropology from Montclair State University and a Ph.D. in anthropology from the Graduate Center-CUNY. He has taught anthropology and Latin American Studies in the City University of New York (CUNY) system, Colby College, Kean College, Felician College, and the University of Costa Rica, and currently teaches at West Chester University in Pennsylvania. His primary area of research is working-class culture and politics. León is currently serving as a member of the MACLAS Executive Council.



Candidate for Executive Council (3-year term)

Norah L. A. Gharala is Assistant Professor of World History at Georgian Court University in Lakewood, NJ, and specializes in the histories of Mexico and the early modern Iberian empires. Norah teaches across global history to place colonial Latin America in Atlantic, hemispheric, and Pacific contexts. Among Norah's publications are Taxing Blackness: Free Afromexican Tribute in Bourbon New Spain (2019) and articles in Journal of Iberian and Latin American Studies (2018) and The Americas (2016).



Candidate for Executive Council (3-year term)

Gonzalo Aguiar Malosetti is an Assistant Professor of Spanish and Portuguese at SUNY Oswego. His research on Latin American intellectual history, literature, cinema, and theatre has been published in journals such as *Revista de Estudios Hispánicos*, *Latin American Theatre Review*, and *Hispanic Review*. His forthcoming book *La modernidad refractada: pensamiento, creación y resistencia en la historia intelectual de Argentina, Brasil y Uruguay (1900-1935)* will be published in 2019 by Editorial Cuarto Propio (Santiago de Chile). His most recent work includes a number of articles, essays, and reviews devoted to José Enrique Rodó's legacy on the centennial of his death. At SUNY Oswego he is also the organizer and coordinator of the Spanish Colloquium and the Brazilian Film Series, both annual events made in conjunction with his other teaching and scholarly responsibilities as Faculty Resident Mentor.



Candidate for Executive Council (3-year term)

Melixa Abad-Izquierdo is Assistant Professor of History at Farmingdale State College in Farmingdale, NY. Her most recent publication is, "Mexican Teleteatros: The Cultural Politics of Prime-Time Series" (*Journal of Iberian and Latin American Studies*. October, 2017). Her research interests are Latin American popular culture and its connections to politics, gender and race.

The Editorial Board is fully engaged in the editorial process, and the journal relies on a great number of colleagues for the external peer review process.

As we start the year, the Editorial Board is now preparing Vol 3 (issue 1 in June; and issue 2 in December). We encourage you to submit your work electronically and spread the word about MARLAS, an interdisciplinary and peer-reviewed journal focusing on Latin American Studies. MARLAS is integrated to the LASA Research Commons digital platform.
